Spotlight on Treasurer Stuart Knee

Around Dyscover

Volunteers

Our wonderful volunteers make up 85% of Dyscover's team. Whether helping in our groups, with activities, fundraising, marketing, admin, gardening or outreach and governance, we couldn't provide our vital services without them.

We have 32 brilliant volunteers **helping in our conversational support groups** and nine of these are in our online zoom groups. Over the last year 17 new group volunteers have joined us.

'Dyscover has a family feel to it' and '**It is the highlight of my week'** were some of the comments volunteers made.

Many of them **go on to study Speech and Language Therapy** or get a job in this field - five volunteers have done this over the last 12 months. Our online groups mean that we are now able to take on volunteers regardless of where they live and our monthly volunteer meetings on zoom help to ensure that **everyone feels a part of Dyscover**.

Funding update from Alice

We reached our fundraising target and can now embark upon the development phase of our Online Expansion Project.

It aims to **establish the need for online aphasia services within the UK,** promoting our expertise and forming new relationships with the view to expanding our current services. The staff will undertake this in addition to their existing roles.

I am also seeking more **funds for our PPA services** and am continuing to work with a volunteer designer and our chosen website developers on our **new website**.

What do you think?

Our annual survey showed that members and their relatives continue to value Dyscover's services.

79% of members and **96%** of relatives rate the long term nature of Dyscover's work and its leadership by Speech and Language Therapists as 'very important'.

97% of members and **92%** of relatives gave Dyscover a performance rating of 4 or 5 out of 5.

When asked how Dyscover had helped members

- **71%** said 'confidence'
- 65% said 'communication'
- 63% said 'adapting to living with aphasia'

It is important to collect feedback so that we can **demonstrate the positive impact Dyscover has to our funders**, and incorporate members' suggestions into future services.

Groups in action

New Foundation Group

There are five members of our new Foundation Group which started last term. Its aim is to develop communication, confidence and tactics.

Members all had their strokes within approximately the last two years. It has been wonderful to witness them getting to know each other and **gain confidence in speaking in a group.**

There has been a lot of sharing of ideas, from Apps to kitchen gadgets! Marc shared his tuna pasta recipe, writing down the ingredients on his whiteboard to help him describe it. This prompted members to **share their experiences of finding useful kitchen gadgets** for chopping, opening tins and cooking with the use of one hand.

The group is led by **Maggie Stapleton**, a Speech and Language Therapist who recently joined Dyscover. She is joined by experienced SLT Assistant Caroline and volunteers Geoff and Danni.

We are **expecting numbers in this group to increase** as we get new referrals. Current members provided input to discussions about what topics to cover next term.



Member Marc Tolentino presented his **spotlight on basketball**, a lifelong interest. Marc did a brilliant job, preparing notes for his talk, using writing and a drawing of **Michael Jordan's basketball vest!**

Getting to know you



Members of the Tuesday zoom group tested their knowledge of one another by seeing if they could match statements about interests and achievements to the right person.

Most statements were matched quickly, and led on to questions, discussion, and greater insights into their fellow members.

When we work online we often adapt our approach and materials to achieve engaging, interesting and productive conversations.

Day Skipper Gary

Wednesday morning group were so impressed to hear that fellow member, Gary, had **passed the first part of his Day Skipper course.** It took a huge amount of time and



perseverance, with the moral support of the Friday reading group, to tackle the amount of written information in the assessment process. Text to speech technology was very helpful during his eight-hour exam.

Reading group

Member Elaine has led the Friday zoom group for two years. Members (including Gary above) have **grown in confidence, insight and reading fluency**. The next Aphasia Forum will feature a talk about the group.

This term we plan to **expand the group** from three members to six.

Groups in action

Apps and technology

Our discussion topic on technology quickly moved on to **sharing useful Apps**, particularly text to speech functions.



Later, members shared worrying experiences of being **targeted by scammers**, and the best approach to avoid becoming a victim. We discussed the particular challenges of scammers exploiting reading and auditory comprehension problems with **fake letters and phone calls**.

Hardly anyone was unaffected, suggesting **this is a topic we should regularly revisit.**

Singing

While aphasia affects the ability of a person to communicate using day-to-day language, singing and the **recollection of song lyrics is often easier** and can be a therapeutic and uplifting



exercise. We invited Sue Cook back to the Wednesday Group **to practise breathing**, **posture and vocal exercises** before launching into some popular favourites.

Leisure interests

Are you an avid sports fan or do you have a passion for music? Aphasia makes it hard to share our interests and talk about past achievements. When offered some options, our



members could join the conversation.

Spotlight on Nial Brown



One of Dyscover's prime beliefs is that **members can go on making progress**, maybe slowly, for many years. Longterm member of Dyscover **Nial**,

certainly shows this belief in action.

Nial's stroke occurred nine years ago and this was followed by physio and speech therapy.

His wife Sarah found out about Dyscover and Nial joined our Kingston group eight years ago. Here he found **people who shared his experiences** and made new friends.

During his time with us, Nial has always been **ready to take on new challenges.** He is a very active Aphasia Ambassador. He also took part in the EVA Park research project, an online virtual

community for people with aphasia. Afterwards Nial **put together a professional video** of Dyscover's participation.

Nial was drawing on his career with the BBC, where he was a video editor. The highlight, he remembers, was **recording the Blue Peter theme tune in the Abbey Road Studios!** And for the past eighteen months Nial has been doing some freelance computer effects work from home. "It is difficult, exciting and amazing", he says.

Nial is also a computer whizz and **uses his tablet to supplement conversation** where necessary. And the keyboards in Nial's photo? For many years he played them professionally and toured the country.

Nial has two sons in their twenties and the elder has just started his first job.
